First nest of White-fronted Swift Cypseloides storeri

White-fronted Swift (*Cypseloides storeri*) is one of the least known Neotropical swifts. I provide the first record of nesting and review the known range of White-fronted Swift. Two nests were photographed in June 2022, near Tacámbaro, Michoacán, Mexico. The data from two breeding sites, each at a waterfall with a single nest, indicates that the breeding season commences with the rainy season. I inspected the contents of one nest which contained a single nestling; this coincides with the clutch size for other *Cypseloides*. Both nests were located near vertically falling water and were protected from above by a rock roof. I compiled 124 records of White-fronted Swifts (museum specimens, eBird, literature, and field observations), from central Mexico and Guatemala. Most records are from the breeding season (June-August), and few to none during the nonbreeding months. White-fronted Swifts are migratory and depart the highland (1500m) breeding area after nesting. The distribution data for the winter season are sparse. I present photos of nesting adult White-fronted Swifts and review the diagnostic marks for field identification.
